Beyond place and time

"Where is home?" is a frequently asked question when unfamiliar people gather in a work or social context. I consistently refer to two places as 'home': the family home where I grew up and my home with my husband and children. This illuminates what home means to me. Home is where I feel most connected to the people who truly know me and whom I love. Home is also the context in which I have grown and developed as a person, the influential environments that shaped my values. Home is not a particular house, as I have lived in multiple family homes throughout my life, and home is not one town or city, as I have lived in four postal codes at various stages. Home is a meta-feeling, a cognitive pastiche of memories, and an anchoring sense of belonging no matter where I live or work.

I close my eyes and recall my childhood home. I am instantly aware of the kitchen, my mother's floured hands as she bakes the weekly biscuits for school lunches, my brothers wrestling on the back lawn, my father bent over his workbench, the towering fir tree beyond our fence, and the sunshine that seems to skitter on every object it touches so that I literally see the energy of this place. I am one with this memory, and I cannot say how old I am or what month it might be, but I know I am home because the sense of this place is felt deeply in my neural synapses, my heart, even my skin. Knitted into my current physical self are memories that hold the key to who I have become, no longer dwelling in that place but not ever leaving, because home travels within me.

The root of the word home is Old English "hām," meaning both a physical place and social gathering. In my childhood home, I lived and learned surrounded by two parents and seven siblings. My father and mother modelled devotion, responsibility, honesty and hard work. My favourite memory of my father is the two of us sitting at the dining table, long after all others have finished, discussing politics, trade unions and the remarkable rise of Robert (Bob) Hawke. I see myself

totally absorbed, my father speaking with me as if I was an equal adult, challenging me to form an opinion and hold my own. I know I am about 11 years old, and this is a formative experience. My father's belief in my ability and expectations of my autonomy and his disregard of my gender as a determining factor in who I can become—these are being woven into my identity and will be sources of strength as the girl becomes a young woman. Home is where I was challenged and where I felt safe: a beautiful dichotomy of high expectations and unconditional love.

There is no greater pull in my life as an adult than the home I have built with my husband and children. Jonathan Sacks said, "when we build, we bond." In the home, a social space we build together, we learn loyalty and trust, strengthen relationships and take on responsibilities. When the energy of our home is disrupted by sadness, grief, anger, frustration, or regret, the emotional force of our bonds may quiver, but it does not splinter. The lessons and values of my childhood home are here in my family home. The strength of my parents and the loyalty of my siblings are living in the relationships I have with my partner and children. I refer to home as I look back in my life and as I look forward.

The continuity of my internalization of 'home' is the profound sense of belonging I have in both contexts. To say "I am home" is to express that deep-down core of who I am and where I came from. When I began to visit my childhood home infrequently, as you do when you have a family of your own in a city far away, I recall my father's response each time. He would hear my footsteps down the side of the house, and he would say, "Where's Catherine?" Then, as soon as I was in front of him, he would follow with, "Ah, here she is." It was as if he had just misplaced my whereabouts for a few moments. And that is being home: where who you are exists outside of place and even time, but forever lives in the relationships you cherish.

Home is Where the Shoes Are

Making cities feel like "home" for everyone has been a lifelong project for Emily Macrae.

"For me personally, home is where my shoes are. Because my legs are not the same length, I count on solid shoes that can keep up with my step count," says Emily. "Shoes are important because long walks are how I've always oriented myself, whether working in Vancouver or studying in Poznań. The state of a sidewalk can tell you a lot about a city and who is supposed to move through that space."

It was in high school at Havergal that Emily was first introduced to the question: What haven't you noticed lately?

"Everyone notices things based on their own experiences," says Emily. "As a disabled person, some of my formative experiences are grounded in ableism, discrimination based on disability. As a result, I notice when systems don't work for people with disabilities."

From subway stations lacking elevators, to movie theatres with poor acoustics, to websites with illegible fonts, Emily notes that barriers to accessibility can be found in so many aspects of daily life.

"If you can't get off the subway at the stop closest to your destination, if you can't hear the dialogue of the latest blockbuster, if you can't read the information on the webpage, making plans and connecting with a community requires a level of energy and effort that many people never notice," says Emily.

Noticing accessibility barriers and working to change them has been a focus for Emily in her studies and her paid and volunteer work.

Since graduating from Havergal, Emily studied at the University of King's College in Halifax, graduating in 2013. She then studied in Poznań, Poland, completing an intensive Polish language course. She went on to do a two-year Master of Science in Urban Planning at the University of Toronto, during which she researched programs run by the City of Toronto to repair and maintain ageing apartment buildings.

Emily currently lives in Toronto and works as a policy advisor for the Ontario Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing. Her work focuses on municipal powers and responsibilities and on helping municipalities build relationships, engage and consult with Indigenous communities.

Emily shares her passion for urban design and accessibility with the broader public. Her writing on these topics has appeared in publications including *NOW, Spacing,* and *Ricochet*. Emily has also volunteered with Heritage Toronto to lead wheelfriendly walking tours of local library history.

Recently, Emily has become involved in the York South Weston Tenants Union and ACORN, a national organization of low- and mid-income families – protecting tenants' rights and drawing attention to loopholes that enable "renovictions." She notes that the COVID-19 pandemic has brought the lack of affordable and supportive housing to the forefront.

"The pandemic has highlighted the urgency of this situation and also surfaced some community-based solutions," says Emily, pointing to the Encampment Support Network – which provides sanitation and other essential supports to folks choosing to live in parks instead of shelters – as one example of neighbours caring for one another to tackle housing issues that are decades in the making.

As Emily puts it, "creating successful communal spaces requires bringing elements of home – and the ingenious hacks and work-arounds that disabled people have engineered to live with dignity – into the public sphere."

A Home 3,500 Miles Away From Home

Willo Heesom has been living in England for 55 years, but she still calls Canada home.

In 1965, accompanying her parents on a trip to England, she went on a blind date with a young dentist from Surrey. A quintessential English gentleman, Tom Heesom escorted Willo to the London Scottish Ball.

The evening began a whirlwind long-distance courtship. A few months later, ostensibly to see the autumn leaves and Niagara Falls, Tom flew to Canada and proposed. They married the following spring. Willo, then age 23, moved to England and into the large, cold family home where he had his dental practice. The dining room served as a waiting room and the converted garage as the dental office.

Her homesickness was intense.

"I moved 3,500 miles from home to be with my husband. When we fell in love, I knew I'd be leaving my country," recalls Willo. "It was a hard decision."

For decades, Willo came home regularly to visit. She reminisces about Canada's wide-open spaces, Muskoka sunsets and the sounds of the wild. She fondly recalls summers at Glen Bernard Camp and her time at Havergal, which she attended from kindergarten to Grade 13, graduating in 1961. For years, she organized Old Girls Reunions in London, which often coincided with the Havergal choir's European tour. She recalls their marvellous performances at Canada House.

The feelings of nostalgia still linger. But Willo grew to love England, where she and Tom lived a happy, full and artistic life. They both sang in a choir and appreciated art, architecture and music

as they travelled throughout Europe. Willo loved the history, ancient cathedrals, gorgeous scenery and charming villages.

In 1972, the pair moved to a beautiful house in the Surrey countryside, where their two Bernese Mountain dogs kept them busy and fit. Willo assisted in the new, purpose-built dental practice until Tom's retirement in 1995. She volunteered at the local hospital for 18 years, putting her degree in psychology to good use. In 2019, she founded a support group for people with macular degeneration.

She converted an old kennel in the garden into a pottery studio overlooking the North Downs. Initially a hobby, pottery later became a professional enterprise; her creations are featured in galleries and exhibitions.

Willo coordinates the local Neighbourhood Watch program, which Tom founded in 2000. Working closely with local police, the group alerts neighbours to suspicious activity, theft, telephone scams and cyber crimes.

She has received two awards for her work with Neighbourhood Watch: in 2013 for best coordinator in Surrey and 2019 for dedicated service over 20+ years.

Tom passed away suddenly in 2007. By then, Willo's sister had also moved to the UK, and their mother joined them just after Tom's death. For 49 years, Willo has lived in the same house which, of course, is now every bit her home.

"I've been lucky to have my new country as well as the one I left behind," she concludes. "I dearly love them both."

Reimagining Paradise

Tiffany Conolly arrived at Havergal from the Cayman Islands in November 2013, having spent the previous day at the beach. Toronto was blanketed with snow; it was the beginning of the coldest winter in decades!

When asked what she missed most about her home during her years at Havergal, Tiffany responds, "The beautiful beaches. I am always filled with joy by the vastness of sky, sea, and sand."

Tiffany did not immediately feel at home in Toronto, even though the boarding school was very welcoming. Boarders were grouped into "families," bringing a home-like atmosphere. But Tiffany needed to get to know the city and how to use the TTC. By her third year, she was able to move about Toronto by bus and subway on her own. Then she felt truly at home.

Tiffany, who now lives back in the Cayman Islands, considers Toronto her second home.

"Being able to call two places home is a gift in itself," she observed. She has since returned several times.

"It feels strange when I arrive at Havergal now. I feel as if I should be taking a box of belongings up to my room, but all I carry now is my handbag! Still, it feels like returning home."

Asked what she misses most about Toronto, she says, "I miss traveling 30 minutes and finding myself in an entirely different place – downtown, Chinatown, Korea town... I miss the snow, and Bubble Tea!"

Tiffany discovered her artistic talent in middle school, and she honed her skills at Havergal. Fascinated by the brain, she considered becoming a neurologist, but she focused on art in the end. She now has combined her two interests and is working to establish an art therapy practice.

In the meantime, her art has provided a business opportunity. Last July, Tiffany discovered her mother's old coffee table that was desperately in need of refinishing. She added ocean motifs and turned it into an object of beauty. After posting a picture of the finished table on social media, she began receiving orders from friends and neighbours.

Tiffany is now the owner of "Peace of Paradise," a business that reimagines pieces of furniture and used household items. Articles published in local online publications helped the business take off. So did the pandemic. With time to clean up and take stock of their belongings, Caymanians have been finding objects on which they would like Tiffany to work her magic. She also takes orders for custom pieces such as serving trays, coasters, placemats and wall art.

Tiffany's home is her theme while she reimagines items or prepares her custom pieces. She uses images of choppy seas or waves and Caymanian emblems such as parrots or the banana orchid. She is passionate about making Caymanians and others aware of these local symbols and their significance.

Not Taking Home for Granted

"Home is where I am at the time," says Audrey Carr, who grew up in Switzerland, Kenya, Canada and the U.S.A. and whose work has taken her even further. While such a life may suggest upheaval and rootlessness, Audrey has embraced the opportunity to create and nurture new friendships and communities wherever she lives. Lasting friendships from her time as a Havergal boarder are a testament to Audrey's winning approach.

Today, Audrey draws on these life experiences and skills as an immigration judge in Minnesota, where many who have left their homelands appear before her hoping to be able to stay in the United States and create a new life. She works hard to make applicants comfortable in the immigration court setting by getting to know their journeys, arranging interpreters, understanding new cultures or calming fears. Exposure to the many stories of people fleeing persecution, economic poverty and violence has made Audrey very grateful for the safety, freedom and luxuries she enjoys in her own home. When others grumble about not being able to see family during the COVID-19 pandemic, Audrey thinks about the people who appear before her in court who are permanently separated from their families.

Audrey's path to immigration judge followed a winding road. After completing her undergraduate degree, Audrey decided to work and travel before going to law school. A job with the United Nations Organization for Women (UNIFEM) took her first to New York City and then to Harare, Zimbabwe.

She worked with governments in southern Africa to make their laws more gender-friendly, allowing women to obtain loans to start businesses that could make them more self-sufficient. It was the beginning of a career focused on helping those less fortunate.

During law school, Audrey got her first taste for immigration and human rights law while working at a legal clinic that provided legal representation to individuals trying to make a new home in the U.S. She discovered she loved the excitement of being in a courtroom.

After graduation, Audrey worked for the Minnesota Advocates for Human Rights, helping immigrants to obtain free legal representation. From there, Audrey went into private practice as an immigration lawyer, which she describes as her court "baptism." She spent many fulfilling hours advocating for clients in deportation cases. Many of these individuals have become lasting friends, a reflection of their gratitude.

This experience qualified Audrey to lead the immigration unit at Legal Services NYC, the largest provider of free legal services in the United States. She remained in that position for nine years. In 2018, Audrey made the leap to her current role as an immigration judge, moving back to Minnesota after an extended period in New York. She and her husband have built a new house and, once again, created a new home. They are rekindling old friendships and building new ones in their community.

A Harder Side of Home

Home is at the heart of Kimberley Weaver's work, helping people in Ontario to find safety and security around housing when faced with life challenges and legal issues.

Towards the end of law school at the University of Toronto, Kimberley did a family law placement at a downtown legal clinic, serving a low-income population that qualified for legal aid.

"I had an aha moment of realizing that what I liked about law school was that I could use my legal training to assist someone," Kimberley says. "I was never that absorbed in abstract concepts, but when the law impacts an individual, I'm really interested."

Kimberley decided to stay in the community legal clinic setting, articling at Peterborough Community Legal Centre and staying on as a staff lawyer where she worked primarily with people at risk of homelessness. Most of her clients were facing eviction due to low income, and had challenges like unemployment, disability, or addiction. Kimberley would negotiate with landlords in an effort to keep people housed and to improve living conditions around basic needs like heat and hydro. She also provided community education on housing laws.

It's a tough field to work in, with all the interconnected issues that lead to homelessness. "These problems, you can't solve all of them," she says. Kimberley has been inspired by past clients whose circumstances improve, and by victories along the way.

She remembers one eviction hearing to which a client brought her preschool-age daughter – a common occurrence, since many don't have access to daycare. Unaware of her family's immediate

risk of eviction, the girl drew for Kimberley while she waited: a picture of herself and her home. "I was able to save that family's home," Kimberley remembers. She still has the drawing.

Always highlighting her clients' humanity, Kimberley believes in challenging preconceived notions. "We tend to make assumptions about people with low income, which aren't true," she says. She focuses on the concerns we share: to meet basic needs, to provide for our families, and to have a comfortable place to call home.

During the pandemic, Kimberley became very aware of accessibility and technology: an Internet connection or a cell phone and access to virtual ways of meeting were not always available to the population she served.

Recently, Kimberley started in a new role at Community Legal Education Ontario (CLEO), whose mandate is to provide materials to teach Ontarians about the laws and to make it as easy as possible for them to understand and participate in legal processes. Kimberley creates tools, like hearing checklists and letter-writing templates, that tenants can use to self-advocate. She also liaises with community workers and legal clinics across Ontario to make legal information widely available and to ensure the materials reflect reality in each community.

"It's a chance to use what I learned on the ground and bring that experience to a wider audience in Ontario," she says. As she continues to support vulnerable populations, Kimberley hopes to make a difference upstream, ultimately helping more families to keep their homes.

Home Away from Home

For Nan Dunlop and her husband John, home can represent shelter, solace and even escape. The COVID-19 pandemic has brought all of these to Nan's attention on both personal and professional fronts.

Nan and John's home provided shelter and solace for their youngest daughter, who moved in following a marital breakup, bringing with her an 18-month-old and an infant. Moving back home made her feel secure and thankful, but she was also experiencing feelings of grief and abandonment. Nan and John did all they could to support her through this.

Nan was extremely busy at the time. As a real estate agent who has been living and working in the Muskoka region since 1985, she was learning how to show properties virtually and deal with real estate clients in a completely new manner. The real estate market exploded, and she found it exhausting dealing with so much electronically. Even with the COVID restrictions in place, Nan worried that she could contract the infection and bring it home to her grandchildren. So, in June, she found an apartment for the young family and helped them move again.

"It was with both relief and a bit of sadness that we moved them," Nan observed, adding that as the pandemic continues, she and John are happy that they had the time with their daughter and her children. They have six other children and numerous grandchildren with whom, sadly, they have not been able to spend time during the pandemic.

Nan is aware of the benefits provided by a second home: a home away from home, a cherished place that provides a break from daily routine. At the beginning of the pandemic, Nan predicted that lots of people would want to escape to a cottage or cabin. She was not wrong! Muskoka became home for many people who had traditionally only vacationed or spent weekends at their recreational property. Working remotely allowed them to "lock down," enjoying the space not afforded to them in the city. When it became apparent that the curve was not flattening, many enrolled their kids in local schools rather than taking them back to the city.

People who were not already fortunate enough to possess second homes started seeking out properties. Prices were pushed up as multiple offers became the norm. Affordable housing in Muskoka has been an issue for year-round residents for many years now, and the spike in the real estate market has made matters worse. Nan is frustrated by this trend, observing that not everyone in the region is wealthy. She has neighbours who are seasonal workers and get laid off in the winter.

"Affordable housing is an issue our local and provincial government should be prioritizing in their planning," she says.

"For many, the pandemic has had the upside of being able to spend more time with family - playing together, learning together, working together. And what were previously considered to be second homes have now become the main arena of their lives."

For most of the extended Havergal community, "home" has always included loving familial support and stability. But for many Toronto youth, including those exiting the foster care system, this may not be the reality. Not-for-profit organizations like StepStones for Youth and their network of volunteers, like Priya Mosur, endeavour to help.

A Different Kind of Home

According to StepStones for Youth's website, 58 per cent of youth experiencing homelessness were involved with child protection services at one time, while 57 per cent of youth who were in foster care are unemployed and depend on social assistance. StepStones offers a variety of support programs to approximately 400 young people between the ages of 15 and 24 as they prepare to leave the care system in Ontario. The organization fulfills basic needs by operating a food bank, connecting young people with access to safe room and board options and facilitating workshops for skills like cooking, interviewing and managing personal finances. The goal is to achieve similar outcomes as for those with secure homes and families.

"When I was 18, if you had told me I suddenly had to do all of this on my own, I would have been so overwhelmed," Priya says. "I was so dependent on my parents at that time. A lot of us take for granted that if you have family around, they'll give you guidance on life skills – what to wear to an interview, how to get a cell phone."

StepStones also runs a mentorship program in which each volunteer is matched with a participant with whom they foster a mentormentee relationship. As Priya says, her role as a volunteer is to "be a person who's in [my mentee's] life to care about them." Priya and her mentee, a young woman, have been paired for almost three years. Pre-COVID, Priya and her mentee regularly went out for dinner to celebrate birthdays, her mentee's high school graduation and other milestones and to chat about goal-setting and her mentee's future plans. Over the past year, their meetings have pivoted to safely-distanced outdoor walks and Zoom hangouts.

As a full-time human resources business partner at RBC, Priya has made it a priority to volunteer in her spare time. Over the years, she has volunteered with a number of organizations, and she has found StepStones to be the most meaningful. The programs, especially the mentorship program, "give a little piece of family" and "create a home environment" for the youth participants, which they seem to really appreciate.

When asked what has inspired her volunteerism, Priya acknowledges that "Havergal had a pretty big emphasis on volunteering and giving back to the community." As a privileged community, she says, Havergal reinforced the "expectation that there are things we should be doing. It definitely impacted me and pushed me to always think about other people too."





The Art of Urban Transformation

After completing her Bachelor of Architecture at the University of Toronto's Daniels Faculty of Architecture, Landscape and Design and an apprenticeship period, Mary moved to New York City in 1988 to study urban design at Columbia University's Graduate School of Architecture, Planning and Preservation.

After several years in the private sector, Mary served with various New York City agencies, including the New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA). There, she served as chief of design and development and later as assistant director for housing and urban design. She has led the transformation of challenging neighbourhoods by identifying and building upon each place's history and potential while collaborating with local residents, community leaders, businesses and service providers. For example, for the "Make Mott Haven" transformation plan for the South Bronx, Mary recommended a balance of preserving and modernizing several mid-20th century apartment buildings, along with new infill development, all connected to a new greenway that links the neighbourhood's existing parks and transportation hubs. By creating safe, connected and well-served communities, Mary's transformational plans now serve as national planning models.

Mary is passionate about housing plans that



are efficient and community-strengthening. She references her own apartment complex in Stuyvesant Town as an interesting example of Modernist planning. The network of buildings is arranged around "The Oval," a central, tree-lined green space. She appreciates the ample outdoor spaces as she walks her dog, Wolfy – her daily escape from being "at home" for the past year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. New York City is, in fact, a laboratory for architecture and urban design, with innovative housing plans created since the early 20th century and inspired by European designs to combat overcrowding, fires and disease.

In 2019, Mary was elevated to become a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects (AIA), which is the AIA's highest honour and a recognition of its members. As an AIA Fellow, Mary is contributing to the TORCH Program with the AIA N.Y. Chapter, whose mission is to mentor young architecture graduates.

Since retiring from service with the City of New York in late 2019, Mary has been enjoying working on her watercolours, as well as researching and writing. In addition to her esteemed career, Mary is also an award-winning watercolour artist. In 2020, she was accepted as an Artist Member of the Salmagundi Club of New York, one of the oldest art organizations in the United States.

Spending so much time at home in the last year has allowed Mary to focus on developing a primer on architecture for young design students. She has been working with a team of design experts and will soon submit a first draft to a publisher. The book will address the recent pandemic and its impact on how we live in cities.

An Occasion to Sojourn

Nestled in a small town in the mountains of British Columbia, Natalie Reisman sounds relaxed. It's a bit of a stretch from her fast-paced life in Toronto, but for the next several months, Squamish will continue to be a temporary home away from home. With six-year-old twin girls and a three-year-old son, Natalie and her partner decided to move out of Ontario in September 2020 to avoid looming lockdowns and a frigid winter. Despite having never been to Squamish, she admits the move has been good for her mental health.

"I needed to do what was right for me and for my family," she says.

Thanks to the ability to work remotely, life in B.C. is somewhat easier. The weather is warmer, the kids can go to school without wearing masks, and the family can decompress with hikes and skiing in the mountains.

Natalie is vice president of the legal division of The Rose Corporation, her father's real estate development company based in Toronto. A commercial real estate lawyer, she was in-house counsel at Restaurant Brands International (RBI) until she went on a three-week trek to Bhutan with her Dad in 2018, and the idea of transitioning to the family business came up. Faced with a possible move to Singapore if she stayed at RBI, she switched to The Rose Corporation.

"The goal is for me to become a leader in the business," Natalie says, and the goal at The Rose Corporation is to build more affordable housing in Southern Ontario, which is seriously lacking in major desirable cities.

But there are hurdles to overcome when working with family. Even with a great dynamic, Natalie finds herself trying to impress her boss at the Rose Corporation as well as her Dad. That pressure, paired with her high ambition, would throw some people off. But Natalie is learning to find her balance both at home and at work.

Her commitment to Sojourn House, a refugee resettlement organization in Toronto, exemplifies her determination to do good. Sojourn House provides emergency shelter and transitional housing to refugees, often people who arrive with just the clothes on their backs.

"They wanted a real estate lawyer and I wanted to give back," Natalie says.

Now several years into her volunteer work, she is chair of the board of directors and proud to be a part of such a wonderful organization, where clients often come back to volunteer themselves.

She is also proud of her time at Havergal and the numerous friendships that have endured. Natalie says she felt connected and supported at Havergal, able to take risks.

"You can just be any version of yourself without being judged," she says.

That confidence, paired with her ability to highlight what matters most in her life, has driven her to become the strong leader she is today. And despite the decreased anxiety that comes with life in a small B.C. town, Natalie knows her future is with her family and friends in Ontario. But for now, the mountains are calling.

Scattered and Rooted

Mary Jean Potter's world is vibrant, abundantly metaphorical and cast in shades of green. Her golden rule, gleaned from her mother: "It's not about what we gather, but really about what we scatter." MJ says she inherited but a few of her mother's ten green thumbs; experimenting with and tending to plants has been a through line of her life.

"Home is where the heart is; and it is a roof over your head," says MJ, both romantic and pragmatic. It's hard to argue with someone who has lived in 25 homes in 10 cities in four countries spanning three continents – an odyssey attributed to MJ's husband's career in the military and later international banking.

Physically, MJ's home is now Toronto. While living abroad, MJ and her husband sent their three children to local schools, never opting to live in expat communities. Helping her children understand why they were living where they were anchored MJ's family. So did her passion for gardening.

Despite Beirut's tumultuous political climate in the 1970s, MJ fondly recalls their abundant balcony garden and the interesting friendships her children formed while attending French and Arabic schools. She glosses over the fact that her family's departure was part of an American rescue effort. MJ's MO, also imparted by her adored mother, is that "a plant has roots, so never give up."

Dedicated to global citizenship and helping others, no singular experience can be described as her most pivotal. However, MJ's time spent working at the Washington Zoo is certainly a highlight. There, she taught inner-city children how to grow vegetables for the animals. They went on to repurpose their concrete schoolyard, planting their own vegetable gardens.

MJ received a master gardener's certificate from the University of the District of Columbia, having completed more than 125 hours of hands-on practicum. Notably, she spent time at River Farm, headquarters of the American Horticultural Society in Alexandria, which is known for showcasing environmentally responsible gardening, composting and recycling. She also worked at the White House Rose Garden, but refrains from divulging any rose preferences!

MJ spontaneously shared this tidbit from her time in Washington. While attending a World Bank function, she was surprised to see Barbara Bush, who asked her to come and see her latest project: hooking a rug. MJ spontaneously replied, "My mother is a hooker" - which gave Barbara Bush quite a laugh. "What a sense of humour hookers have - rug hookers, that is!" says MJ.

As she is a member of The Garden Club of Toronto, The Ivy Society and the Herb Society as well as a horticultural judge, avid gardeners frequently approach MJ for advice. Her grandchildren living abroad will video chat and hold their plants to the camera, asking, "Grandma, what do I do with this?!"

"Oh what fun we had!" says MJ about her time as a boarder and day girl at Havergal, the first of three generations to attend the College.

If you ask MJ how she would advise Old Girls to enhance their spaces, she suggests taking a few minutes each day to look at a plant; you will instantly relieve any stress. If tending to plants at home, get your fingers dirty, do not over-water and place them where they see the light of day. "Keep your fingernails short!"

Receives Havergal Old Girls Life Achievement Award By Naomi Sedgwick Schafler 1983 and Karen Williams 1983

ouching a nerve is one thing. 2.8 million views, 53,892 reactions and 1,675 shares (and counting) on social media to her post about the indignity suffered by people of colour is a lightning-rod moment. This is Kim Thompson's moment.

Kim has always been the ultimate "go getter." She made friends easily – a tried and true Ellen Knox protégée! More telling: she keeps friends close, no matter the distance. She has an inexhaustible ability to network and keep connections fresh. Since moving to the U.S. to attend Cornell University, Kim has bridged the distance with open invitations to visit and stay or to connect in Europe or elsewhere.

Launching a career in law in the early 1990s after graduating from Berkeley, Kim ascended through the legal profession while raising two incredible children with her husband, John Bliss. Honing the tools of her trade would prove invaluable in her future roles with PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC).

In 2018 our class celebrated our 35th Reunion in grand style, hosting a dinner party in downtown Toronto. The event was a cacophony of constant chatter, as we became again that cohesive group of schoolgirls known as the Class of '83.

Kim had flown into town for the event from her home in Oakland, California. Naturally, there was a great deal to catch up on, but one story reached the core of everyone within Kim's earshot. She had recently lost a work colleague who had the grave misfortune of mistakenly entering the wrong apartment. The story is all too familiar – shoot the Black man first, ask questions later. For Kim, this was a call to action. Filled with passion, empathy and determination, Kim vowed that she would do all she could to stop these kinds of senseless acts.

Philanthropy is a foundational strength that Kim shares with her husband. The Oakland area has benefitted from their generosity of time and spirit as they work towards eliminating poverty and improving the lives of youth.

Considered a "mover and shaker" in Oakland's political and social scene, Kim has met with Vice President Kamala Harris several times and is good friends with Oakland Mayor Libby Schaaf and Congress Member Barbara Lee. Kim is equally enthusiastic about volunteering at a local recreation center, hosting a "salon-style" dinner party or fundraiser for local street artists, muralists or non-profits at her home and supporting small female-owned businesses.

As the pandemic turned the world upside down and systemic racism found centre stage, Kim stepped forward to pen a post in her authentic, heartfelt voice:

"These senseless acts upset me not only as an empathetic human, but also because they are needless, painful reminders of indignities that I face daily," she wrote. "When I'm with people who know me, I'm a respected wife, mom, colleague, board member, friend, volunteer, neighbor, etc. But once outside of those insulated bubbles, I'm an anonymous Black woman subject to diminished respect and trust and it's exhausting."

Last year, at the peak of her career as a corporate attorney leading one of PwC's Global consulting business lines, Kim made a radical change and decided to dedicate the rest of her career to addressing issues of diversity and inclusion in the United States. She was selected through an extremely competitive process to be a CEO Action for Racial Equity fellow. In this new role, she is part of the small leadership team of this innovative, private sector start-up focused on implementing real solutions to systemic racism toward African Americans and addressing related issues such as early childhood development, criminal justice and reparations.

We now add Havergal's Old Girls Lifetime Achievement Award to Kim's many accomplishments. May this award fuel her ongoing pursuit of social justice, equality and inclusion. And may her story inspire all Havergalians to champion the issues that she so passionately promotes.

Receives the 2021 Dr. Susan Ditchburn Young Alumna Award harlotte Anderson has successfully and seamlessly transformed the lessons and ideals learnt as a student at Havergal into her professional and personal life.

As a leader who dreams big, Charlotte has worked tirelessly and passionately to achieve her goals. A little over a year after graduating with her master's in physiotherapy from the University of Toronto, she imagined and then established her own physiotherapy practice, ALPHA Health Services. Now, eight years later, her practice includes 26 employees at four locations across the GTA and Muskoka, including a clinic at Havergal. Charlotte has also travelled to Whitehorse, Yukon, several times to provide physiotherapy to an underserved population of diverse Canadians in need of rehabilitation. She has expanded her clinics to offer a range of health care services avenues (including multiple physio streams, massage therapy, podiatry, sports medicine and naturopathy) to service the health and well-being of her patients. Her team brings a level of professionalism and competency in health services that starts with Charlotte's leadership.

Charlotte knows success comes from being a lifelong learner. She is highly regarded by her peers as a thoughtful and knowledgeable leader. Seeing a gap in the rehab space in concussion management and feeling she could make a difference, Charlotte pursued her PhD with research in concussion treatment in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto, followed by post-doctoral work at McMaster University in the School of Rehabilitation Sciences. Her intellectual curiosity and problem-solving skills have led her to change the landscape of concussion management, and her work has been presented internationally. Valued by her students as a teacher with a genuine passion for learning, she started a student-led concussion clinic at Holland Bloorview Kids Rehabilitation Hospital in Toronto. With five clinicians and researchers, Charlotte has co-founded a multidisciplinary concussion management clinic in Ottawa with plans to expand this model to the national level. Her dedication to learning and teaching has resulted in Charlotte being appointed education lead for the Canadian Physiotherapy Association and having an academic appointment at the University of Toronto.


But beyond her innovation, research and teaching, it is her dedication to her patients and her community where Charlotte truly shines. Even on her toughest days, she is enthusiastic, positive and full of energy. She will work long hours, do house calls or tele-physio to help her patients heal and stay well. One patient stated, "Charlotte knew that my fear of re-injury was a challenge. She coached me to develop the confidence to move my body again... and checked in regularly, offering encouragement and hope."

Charlotte often speaks about the importance of giving back to Havergal. She has run a physiotherapy clinic at the College since 2013 and supported the rowing program as a coach for several years. Every year at the rowing banquet, crews get up and speak about their coaches. The words of thanks and admiration from Charlotte's crew are heartfelt and speak to her excellence both in and out of the clinic. Not only does Charlotte surround herself with mentors, but she is also a committed mentor to those coming after her. She currently serves on the HOGA Career & Education Committee and has been a mentor to Havergal students for university transition and career networking events.

While Havergal made a big impact on Charlotte, Charlotte has definitely created an impact beyond the ivy walls. She is an advocate and an inspiration to all who know her. Havergal gave Charlotte the confidence to follow her passions and take risks, and she has managed challenges and changes with strength, grace and steadiness that warrant recognition. It has been exciting to see her dreams become reality. We can doubtless expect to see many more accomplishments and contributions from Charlotte in the future.

Havergal's Wellbeing Program

This year, Havergal students have wellbeing time woven into their academic schedules as a reminder that a focus on health is just as important as academics. This time is used in different ways to promote community building, wellbeing and the development of executive functioning skills.

In the Junior School, the Wellbeing Program aims to support the growth and development of our students in all areas of their curricular and emotional learning. Each grade has blocks of time allocated to this work, which include activities such as guided meditations, drama, open dialogue and mindfulness journaling. In Grade 2, for example, students have the opportunity to explore their feelings, discover strategies that help them deal with these emotions and understand that they are not alone in the way they feel. It has proven to be a time where the girls are learning more about themselves, naming their various emotions and developing individual toolkits that will help them today and in the future.

To date, Junior School students have focused on the topics of student rights and responsibilities at school, identity through a study of our names and how to build and maintain friendships. Teachers in the Junior School strongly believe that through listening powerfully, reflecting deeply, sharing vulnerably and collaborating fully, they will continue to develop this program for our students in Kindergarten to Grade 6.

The Middle School Grade 7 and 8 Wellbeing Program provides students with an intentional framework in which to develop skills and strategies and to adapt to changing circumstances. The program centres on supporting students in developing their own toolkits for wellbeing and familiarizing themselves with their support team at Havergal. Through learning activities that emphasize engagement, capacity building, goal setting, collaboration and cooperation, students have been strengthening learning skills, social skills and their

sense of social responsibility. Specific lessons have included executive functioning skills as they pertain to planning; organization and time management; our school's values with a focus on self-respect and respect for others; and resilience, stress and the brain, stress management techniques, mindfulness and coping strategies. The Middle School guidance counsellors look forward to using student feedback to explore further the topics of growth mindset, compassion and empathy, gratitude, self-esteem, leadership and conscious choice making.

The Grade 9 to 12 Wellbeing Program is likewise off to a strong start. Students have participated in a variety of lessons developed by their guidance counsellors to engage them in learning various tools, skills and concepts to enhance wellbeing. A focus in Grades 9 and 10 has been on strategies that help improve resilience. Students have learned how mindfulness, an "attitude of gratitude" and time management skills can boost resilience. Another focus has been friendship-namely, rehearsing the conversation skills necessary for building new connections and strategies for navigating conflict with friends. Students in Grade 11 have been focusing on relationship building, time management and exploring university pathways. The Grade 12 class has been using their wellbeing time to reconnect as a graduating class and to participate in sessions about the university application process. Over the coming months, sessions in the Upper School will include guest speakers and activities organized by the student grade representatives.

Using student feedback, the Wellbeing Program at Havergal will continue to grow and develop throughout the school year. As a community, focusing on our wellbeing allows students to feel more connected with their peers and become authentic agents of their health.

These findings will inform a foundation to support and enhance the College's commitment to DEI work. We will share more information once this project commences.


Our Upper School students had an opportunity to meet and hear from Professor Ashraf at Prayers in the week following the April Break.
